March has become synonymous with MEA Testing over the years, and this year is no different. Our leadership team is busy creating a schedule that will provide our students ample time to take the Maine Educational Assessment, but also allow us to get back to the daily teaching and learning as soon as possible. We value and utilize the feedback the MEA provides us, but we also recognize that no one test can replace the ongoing excellent learning opportunities our teachers provide each day. The MEA window is open from March 18<sup>th</sup>-April 12<sup>th</sup>, and we will send out the specific times each team will be testing once that is completed.

We are excited to offer a parent screening of the film *Resilience, The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope.* This movie was recommended to us by one of our community partners, MidCoast Health, and it deals with issues that come with child-hood trauma and stress. Will have Elizabeth Munsey from MidCoast Health, Substance Abuse Counselor Geno Ring, and a pediatrician from MidCoast Hospital joining us for the viewing and discussion. Vaping is a concern we share with all other schools in the country. Earlier in February, I was part of a group that did a presentation for the School Board about vaping and what we are doing to educate and prevent this for our students. At BJHS, our staff will be getting some more in depth training so we can look for signs or evidence that this may be going on. We are currently examining our curriculum to identify where we are educating our students on the dangers of vaping to determine if this should be expanded to younger grades. Additionally, we are putting together a parent information evening, with more details to come soon.

#### What do these codes mean?

If you've been checking your child's attendance in PowerSchool and you aren't sure what the attendance codes mean, here is a simple explanation of codes:

EA = Excused Absence (absent and received an excuse note)

ED = Early dismissal

ET = Excused Tardy (came in late with excuse note)

FT = Field Trip

PA = Prearranged Absence (2 or more days of planned absence)

PE = Parent Excused (parent phoned in student, but no excuse note received)

PU = Prearranged but unexcused

UA = Unexcused Absence (absent, no excuse note received)

UT = Unexcused Tardy (came in late, no excuse note received)

Hello BJHS Community, the first half of the year has been great with minimal traffic issues here on campus. Unfortunately, since Christmas break we have had an increased amount of passed school bus complaints here on BJHS property. I would like to provide some education around this for everyone to hopefully avoid future violations that put student safety at risk.

The State of Maine requires the following: The operator of a vehicle on a way, in a parking area or on school property, on meeting or overtaking a school bus from either direction when the bus has stopped with its red lights flashing to receive or discharge passengers, shall stop the vehicle before reaching the school bus. The operator may not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or until signaled by the school bus operator to proceed.

If a violation occurs, it can result in a Class E crime which, notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1301, is punishable by a \$250 minimum fine for the first offense and a mandatory 30-day suspension of a driver's license for a 2nd offense occurring within 3 years of the first offense.

Please use caution and obey the law around school busses. Any questions please feel free to contact me at the school.



### March is Sleep Awareness Month.

Does the light from a cellphone or computer make it hard to sleep? Research says yes it does. The light from these devices confuses the brain into thinking it's time to wake up instead of fall asleep. The blue light tricks the brain into thinking its daytime and when that happens the body stops releasing a sleep hormone called melatonin. Darkness helps trigger the release of melatonin, the blue light delays it. Teens are more sensitive to the blue light than adults. The best way to be sure your brain is at its best for school, sports and other things that require focus is to stop using computers and cellphones for an hour or two before bedtime.

Students choosing **band** should have participated in the previous year or have permission from Ms. Anderson Any student may choose to join **chorus** in 7th and 8th grade.



# BUS to BUS Transition


## 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Students & Parents Please Take Note!




