

Dear Parents and Caregivers,





Congratulations to the Brunswick Junior High Math Counts team who placed third in the state at the State Final Competition earlier this month. Thomas McCormack placed 7th in the state overall. Other team members were Wes Haynes, Maia Pietraho, and Quin Repetto. Isabella Purnell-Amaez also qualified to compete as an individual in the state final competition.

The 7th and 8th grade math teams had a strong showing at the Pi Day Southern Maine Math League meet. The 7th grade team placed fourth out of 21 teams, with Wes

Haynes having an overall third place individual high score. The 8th grade team placed sixth out of 18 teams. They have their final meet of the year on May 2 during the school day at the Portland Expo. The 6th grade team will also be competing that day.

Math homework is due tomorrow — how can I help?

Homework causes trouble in many households. Relax—remember whose homework it is! Think of yourself as more of a guide than a teacher. Don't take over for your child. Doing that only encourages him or her to give up easily or to ask for help when a problem becomes difficult.

The best thing you can do is ask questions. Then listen to what your child says. Often, simply explaining something out loud can help your child figure out the problem. Encourage your child to show all work, complete with written descriptions of all thinking processes. This record will give your child something to look back on, either to review or to fix a mistake, and can also help the teacher understand how the problem was solved.

Asking the following kinds of questions can help you and your child tackle the challenges of math homework:

- What is the problem that you're working on?
- Are there instructions or directions? What do they say?
- Are there words in the directions or the problem that you do not understand?
- Where do you think you should begin?
- Is there anything that you already know that can help you work through the problem?
- What have you done so far?
- Can you find help in your textbook or notes?
- Do you have other problems like this one? Can we look at one of those together?
- Can you draw a picture or make a diagram to show how you solved a problem like this one?
- What is your teacher asking you to do? Can you explain it to me?
- Can you tell me where you are stuck?
- Is there someone you can call to get help? Can you discuss the problem with a classmate?
- Would using a calculator help you solve the problem?
- Would it help to go on to another problem and come back to this one later?
- Why don't we look for some help on the Internet?
- If you do only part of a problem, will the teacher give you some credit?
- Can you go in before or after school for help from the teacher?

Besides supporting your child on homework, show the importance of learning math by helping your child connect math with daily life. Point out your own activities that involve mathematics, such as deciding if you have enough money to buy items on a shopping list, estimating how long it will take to make a trip, determining how much carpet or wallpaper to buy for a room, or developing a schedule to complete a series of tasks. Talking about these everyday situations will give you a chance to increase your child's appreciation for the usefulness of math!

Web Browser History

All web browsers (Firefox, Google Chrome, Edge, Internet Explorer, Safari, etc.), keep track of user internet activity.

Storing certain information locally in a "cache" file, your computer combines this information with updated data that is downloaded as needed. This helps web pages load much faster compared with downloading website data for each viewing.

History logs also provide a way to revisit web pages from earlier in the day, yesterday, or months ago. On your personal computer, you have the option to delete an entire history log or individual history entries.

However, BJH students do not have this option when using Google Chrome. Students cannot delete their entire history or any individual entries. History logs typically go back to September. This provides a way for parents, teachers, and administration to follow up on questions of behavior and digital citizenship.

Grade 7 students have access to Google Chrome, Firefox, and Safari, while grade 8 students use Google Chrome exclusively, since it integrates well with the Google Suite of apps that are used extensively here.





Hello BJHS Community, the first half of the year has been great with minimal traffic issues here on campus. Unfortunately, since Christ-mas break we have had an increased amount of passed school bus complaints here on BJHS property. I would like to provide some education around this for everyone to hopefully avoid future violations that put student safety at risk.

The State of Maine requires the following: The operator of a vehicle on a way, in a parking area or on school property, on meeting or overtaking a school bus from either direction when the bus has stopped with its red lights flashing to receive or discharge passengers, shall stop the vehicle before reaching the school bus. The operator may not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or until signaled by the school bus operator to proceed.

If a violation occurs, it can result in a Class E crime which, notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1301, is punishable by a \$250 mini-mum fine for the first offense and a mandatory 30-day suspension of a driver's license for a 2nd offense occurring within 3 years of the first offense.

Please use caution and obey the law around school busses.
