PHOTOGRAPHY SCAVENGER HUNT

Photography can be a very powerful art form. We take photographs all the time these days (think of the popularity of things like tumblr, instagram, etc.), but in the hands of artists, photography can literally change the way we see the world! Photography can be used to document current events, to bring about justice, to illustrate the effects of environmental issues, to investigate new discoveries, and to point out the unnoticed beauty in our surroundings.

In short, photography makes us see the world in new ways.

As we go on photography field trips around the school, challenge yourself to take artistic photographs that make us see things in new and unique ways. A fun and easy way to force yourself to take photographs from unique points of view is to go on a scavenger hunt – not for objects, but for photographs that illustrate **prepositions** (see the list on the back of this paper).

Photography Ground Rules:

- Think like a photographer:
 - Compose your shot (decide what is in view and what is left out)
 - Avoid distractions in the background
 - o Control the focus no blurry photos!
 - Look for a unique point of view (including getting up close)
- NO HUMANS IN YOUR PHOTOS (Gets too silly too quickly!)
- Be responsible with the iPads:
 - Close the case while walking with it in the halls
 - Keep it safe and secure at all times
 - Stay on task no playing games, or using other apps
 - Do not delete, move, or edit anyone else's photographs
 - Keep your photographs organized (at the end of each class, delete your unwanted photos, and move the keepers into your own album)
 - Return iPad to the correct slot I will plug them in later

Prepositions connect nouns, pronouns, and phrases with other words in a sentence. It gives information about location, direction, space, or time.

"The dog sat *under* the tree."

"We saw the lightning before we heard the thunder."

Each day we go on a photography field trip around the school, you will need to end up with at least 10 good photographs that clearly illustrate a preposition. It is not a race, and you should not take just 10 photographs each day! Professional photographers sometimes take thousands of photographs in order to be able to choose just the best ones later on.

Check off the prepositions you use each day, so you don't repeat yourself.
