Democracy




Definition:

- a system of government by the whole population or all the eligible [qualified, authorized] members of a state, typically through elected representatives.
- government by the people; from the Greek word demos, meaning "the people"
- A form of government in which the supreme power is held in the people and exercised [applied] directly by them or by their elected agents under a free electoral system.


So what does that all mean??!

- Democracy depends on YOUR participation in voting and being aware of elections!
- Your values and interests are meant to be represented by elected officials.





Party System



- The 2 major political parties are the Republican and Democratic Parties.
- There are several other smaller ones, such as the Green Party, and some candidates identify as Independents.

Characteristics (General) of Parties

Election Process

- Before each election, citizens are informed who is on the <u>ballot</u>, which the document listing all the options for voting.
- However, sometimes people submit a <u>write-in</u>, which is when they vote for someone not on the ballot.

Many candidates or supporters of an issue have a <u>platform</u>, which is a set of ideas or promises related to the person or position.

Election Process, Continued...

- •After the <u>campaign</u>, in which candidates and organizations try to convince the voters of their importance/worth, the election occurs.
- •For *presidential* elections, there is a <u>primary</u> in which candidates are nominated for the ballot.
- •For the *presidency*, there is also a <u>caucus</u>, which is a meeting to support a candidate or cause.





The Electoral College

- Voting U.S. citizens do not directly elect the President and Vice President; instead <u>intermediaries</u> called "<u>electors</u>," who almost always have pledged to vote for particular presidential and vice presidential candidates do.
- Electors are assigned to each of the 50 states as well as to Washington, D.C. <u>The number of electors in each</u> <u>state is equal to the number of members the state</u> <u>has in Congress</u>, and the District of Columbia has 3.
- There <u>are currently 538 electors</u>, corresponding to the 435 members of the House of Representatives and 100 senators, plus the three additional electors from the District of Columbia.
