Committee Reports

a. Policy & Planning Committee - J. Prescott

The committee met December 5th. They looked at several policies that have some relations to athletics and co-curricular activities but no changes were identified. The nurses along with the school physician and athletic directors will be looking at recent national guidelines concerning management of concussions. The administrative team will be looking at Policies ADC-R and JICH, tobacco and substance abuse, for any possible revisions. The next meeting is scheduled for January 3rd at 5:30 p.m.

- b. Student Services Committee M. Merrill
 The December 7th meeting was rescheduled to January 11th at 9:45 a.m.
- c. School Building Committee W. Thompson and S. Singer The committee met on November 28th. The Board met to agree to a work change order due to additional hazardous materials on site that was discovered when the building was being demolished. Jordan Acres is completely down and they are now starting to build the new school. A group from the committee met with the Director of Special Collections at Bowdoin, Kat Stefko. We would like to publicly thank Bowdoin for their offer of anything from their Kate Furbish collection digitally or any resources or information that they can help us with.
 - Interior Design Sub-Committee E. Sokoloff
 The committee met on December 10th. The committee saw samples and was able to make some color and material decisions on flooring, light fixtures, tiles, lockers, wall coverings, and classroom signage. They looked at different light fixtures that will be hanging in the Meadow's Edge (the corridor outside the library) and they chose pendant lights that symbolize fireflies. The next meeting will be determined at a later date.
- d. Budget & Finance Committee B. Tucker

The committee met this evening. Tom Stocker, BHS teacher, gave a presentation on BHS Science Department strategic five-year budget proposal. The committee's next meeting is scheduled for January 9th at 6:00 p.m.

e. Curriculum & Program Development Committee – E. Sokoloff
The committee met today. They wanted to thank Corey Perreault for her 18 years of service on the committee, however, she was unable to attend the meeting. The committee talked about the curriculum review cycle due to the change of Curriculum Coordinator. The next meeting date is to be determined.

f. Wellness Committee - E. Sokoloff

The committee met on December 6th with Shanna Crofton now at the helm. "The purpose of the committee moving forward will be to research and share information and resources that promote a healthy school community. Two goals were set for the remainder of this year: 1. Support staff wellness k-12; and 2. Research and share ways to incorporate physical activity into the school day to enhance learning outcomes." The committee has formed sub-committees to work on these goals. The committee also received an update from Scott Smith on the state's district food service review. The state gave some suggested changes which have been made and finalized. The committee also discussed the continuing partnership with Let's Go and qualifications for mini-grants for each school. The next meeting is scheduled for February 28th at 3:45 p.m.



- During a guided sightseeing tour, visit the imposing marble edifice that houses the Hô Chi Minh Mausoleum, his wooden stilt house, and the One Pillar Pagoda.
- During lunch, you'll meet a veteran of the Vietnam War and will have a chance to talk with them about the reconciliation after 1975.
- Travel to the city of Ha Long.

Day 5: Ha Long | Da Nang | Hoi An

- Embark a junk (a traditional Chinese-style sailing ship) for your cruise along the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Ha Long Ray, which translates to the "Bay of Descending Dragons." During your cruise, disembark to explore a local cave.

 Once you arrive, transfer to Hoi An.

Day 6: Hoi An

- Immerse yourself in the daily life of a local fisherman this morning. You'll learn traditional fishing techniques and paddle the river in authentic hamboo-basket boats.
- Enjoy a walking tour of Hoi An's Ancient Town, which includes the famous Japanese covered bridge, the Pottery Museum, the 200-year-old Tamky House, the Chua Ong Pagoda, and a viorant market.
- Have dinner at your own page or
- o participate in a Vietnamese cooking class.

Day 7: Hoi An | Da Nang | Hô Chi Minh City

- Enjoy free time this morning to further explore.
 Hoi An or visit a local beach.

Day 8: Hô Chi Minh City

- Visit the famous Cù Chi Tunnels, synonymous with the Vietnam War. The tunnels allowed the Viet Cong to control a vital area of South Vietnam and, at the time of the war, stretched all the way from the Cambodian border to Saigon.
- Stroll through the lively Ben Thanh Market, where you'll find everything from street food to souvenirs.
- Get the Vietnamese perspective on the war as you explore the War Remnants Museum.

Day 9: Hô Chi Minh City

- Explore some of the country's most enchanting landscapes by sampan (a flat-bottomed wooden boat). Oruise the Mekong Delta's Ham Luong River, stopping at local workshops along the way.
- See more of local life in the community by hooping on an auto rickshaw.
- Late this afternoon transfer back to Hê Chi Minh City and head to Nguyen Hue Street for a final faraweil dinner.


