
5-2-1-0 Update

Is there a favorite old book or series that you would like to see in the Coffin Library?





Did You Know? A Reading TipBerenice Knight, Reading Recovery Teacher



You must hear a word before you can say it or read it or write it. If you've never heard the word "enormous" you won't understand it when it's time to read it or write it.

A child's brain has a "word reservoir" and one of the jobs of a parent is to pour so many words into this reservoir that it overflows into speech and then into reading and writing.

By age four, children who have listened to many, many books and who have joined in many, many conversations have heard about **45 million words** from their families – and children who have not had these experiences have heard just **13 million words**. That's a 32 million-word difference equaling one year's head start for the advantaged child. *

There is no doubt that listening to books and conversations at home prepares a child for reading success in school.
