Dear Coffin School Families,

I hope this finds all of you well.

March continues to be a busy month at Coffin School and throughout our District. At last week's School Board meeting we received the go-ahead to expand our multiage Grade 1/2 program from two to four classrooms beginning in the 2014-15 school year. This is an exciting shift for us and we're looking forward to having an additional 18 Grade 2 students with us at Coffin next year.

We're also in the midst of the budget season and the proposed FY 2015 Coffin budget will be presented to the Board at Wednesday's meeting. Two highlights in this proposed budget include increasing monies for targeted writing instruction, staff development and the purchase of hardcover books to continue building our library collection. These two items represent an increase of approximately \$7,500 in our total proposed Coffin School budget or about seven percent.

In addition to staffing configurations and budgets, there's a lot happening around facilities. At the March 19 meeting the Board approved the use of the former Jordan Acres School site for a proposed new school. This facilities discussion has been ongoing for about three years and will be receiving even more focus in the months to come.

Here at Coffin we are all looking forward to fewer indoor recess days and ice-free playgrounds. I haven't checked any historical statistics, but do know that when Mrs. Murphy (Coffin Music teacher and conductor of the wonderful spring choral concerts) celebrated her birthday earlier this week, she told me that it's the first time in years that she's worn a winter coat on that day. Thankfully spring has arrived, at least on the calendar, and warming days and drier playgrounds are inevitably on the horizon.

Kindergarten Reading Support Services at Coffin School

An update from our Response to Intervention (RTI) team

Here at Coffin School we are very fortunate to be
able to offer a variety of early intervention Reading

Support services targeted specifically for Kindergar-

ten students. Reading Support services can begin as early as September, or may be started at any point in the school year. Here are some answers to questions you may



have if your child is chosen to receive extra help in reading:

Who will provide the extra help?

We have a team of Reading Support teachers who work closely with your child's classroom teacher and will also communicate with you to make sure that your child's needs are being met.

What do reading groups look like?

Lots of students receive Reading Support services throughout the school year! Depending on your child's strengths and areas of need, he or she will be in a group of 2 or 3 students. These groups typically meet inside or outside of the classroom, everyday, for about 30 minutes a session.

What skills will my child be working on?

Our Reading Support teachers use data to guide their instruction and plan lessons to meet your child's individualized needs. These lessons often focus on building an awareness of print, letter identification, letter sounds, writing, comprehension, and oral language development.

Will my child be in a reading group all year?

Your child's Reading Support teacher will closely monitor his or her progress while receiving extra help. This, combined with input from you, and the classroom teacher, will help us decide when a student is ready to be dismissed from Reading Support services. This can happen at anytime in the school year, but we usually provide students with a minimum of 6-8 weeks of instruction.

We look forward to working with you and your Child!



A Message From Mrs. Bradley Coffin School Counselor


Please mark your calendars and spread the word to any parents of incoming Kindergarteners that the 2014-15 **Kindergarten Screening** will take place the week of May 19 at the Curtis Memorial Library.

If a child will turn 5 on or before October 15, 2014, parents need to call the superintendent's office at 319-1900 after April 1st for a registration packet and further information; registration information can also be found on the Coffin School website at

In February and March all students in Kindergarten, Grade 1 and multiage classes learned about what kinds of behavior are considered bully-

ing and what they can do about it. After listening to a story I read, we learned the importance of students who witness or experience any behavior that feels unwelcome, uncomfortable or unsafe to report this to a trusted adult at school as soon as possible.



Children were given the opportunity to draw and write about where they felt most safe and comfortable at school and where they might have had an experience that made them feel unwelcome or unsafe at school. Some classes also identified the most welcome or unwelcome spaces in the school on a simple map outline of spaces they go each day including the bus ride. Any area of concern that was identified by a child as still ongoing has been or will be followed up.

Overall I am pleased to report the majority of students had no unsafe or unwelcome experiences at school to report and when asked to name one safe space, they named their classroom as the most welcome and safe space as well as many other learning places in our school.

To reinforce the **importance of personal safety**, students in all classes will watch a puppet presentation by a team from SASSMM of Mid Coast Maine to learn about telling a trusted adult at home or at school about any unwelcome or confusing touch. A letter about these presentations was sent home last week. Children will also be bringing home handouts after each presentation.


