Hello Coffin School Families,

I hope that this finds all of you well.

It was a pleasure seeing so many of you at our recent Harvest Festival and then last weekend at the annual All Elementary Craft Fair. Lots of fun things happening this time of year and a credit to our wonderful Community for Coffin parent group.

As you all know, it's also the season for our first round of parent/teacher conferences. I took a few moments today to check in with both students and adults about hopes for conferences. Below are a few of their thoughts.

A theme with the adults is the hope that conferences will serve as one of the many ways of strengthening all important home/school relationships. Teachers are excited for the opportunity to share those, "Look what I can do now!" moments and to continue developing understandings about where we are in our learning and where we're heading. It's all a process and I was reminded of how even though it's still very early in the developmental stages for many of our younger students, there is still so much to celebrate.

Many students told me they were most proud of specific work they wanted their families to see - writing, sounding out words, spelling, reading books – and two themes emerged. The first was how hard they'd been working (that 'growth mindset' - love it!) and the second was how far they had come since the beginning of the year. One student said to me, "I want my mom and dad to be impressed with how much I've changed...I'm doing better penmanship and I've bumped up to paper with more lines." Another told me, "I wasn't such a good writer and now I am...I've learned how to make my characters come alive." It's conversations like these that bring me a deep sense of satisfaction and gratitude for all that's happening at Coffin Elementary School.

We'll look forward to meeting with you at conferences and wish you and your families a relaxing and joyful Thanksgiving holiday.

- 0 sugary drinks, more water and low-fat milk


* Keep TV/computer out of bedroom. No screen time under the age of 2.

Differentiation Update

- Teachers at Coffin Elementary School are constantly learning new ways to differentiate academic instruction, tasks, and activities in the classroom. Our students come
- to school with different
- levels of knowledge, skills, interests, and understand-
- ing, and these vary across
 time and topics. Teachers
 use assessment results and
- THE DIFFERENTIATED
- daily observations to get a better understanding of their students' readiness, interests, and learning preferences,
- and they use this information to adapt what and how they teach. For example, a teacher may vary the amount of
- time he or she spends reviewing a given topic, provide a demonstration and extra opportunities for students to
- practice a new task, and assign students to small groups to complete a project. These are all examples of academic differentiation in the classroom, and ways that our
- teachers are working hard to help all students reachlearning goals.

Playground Safety, the Coffin Way

Many of our families use the playground outside school hours and we've received several requests for the guidelines followed during the school day. Hopefully this will be helpful and thank you all for assisting us in promoting safety on our playground at all times.

BE A BAXTER'S HELPER

<u>Be Gentle</u>- each person is responsible for keeping others safe from physical harm. Use gentle tagging and words to remind others not to grab, tackle, and push. Use personal space.

- <u>Be Kind</u> take care of others feelings by solving problems using "I" statements and Rock Paper Scissors, tell the truth, and take short turns on equipment if there is a line. USE THE BUDDY BENCH! Invite others to join in games and welcome EVERYONE!
- <u>Be Safe</u> respect others and use equipment the right way. Follow the rules of any game/activity. Stay in the boundaries/fenced area of the playground. Alcoves are off limits, if a teacher can't see you don't go there! Woodchips are for safety; leave them where they are put! Small sticks are OK as tools, but not weapons. Large sticks should be removed by duty teachers.

<u>Be Responsible</u> – pick up equipment and return it to the recess boxes, help with cleanup, use the trash cans. Use the bathroom BEFORE recess. Don't touch plants or small trees!

SPECIFIC EQUIPMENT

 \underline{SLIDES} – go down feet first on bottoms. No going UP slides. Make sure the end of the slide is clear before starting. If there is a large puddle at the end of the slide it may be marked off limits by teachers.



CHAINS - any number of children can go on them, the more weight the less it moves!



<u>SILO</u> – only 3 children at a time, feet up to the third rung down, no higher. No sitting on the top!

<u>PULL UP BARS AND HORIZONTAL LADDER MONKEY BARS</u> - may not sit or stand on top of either piece. On Pull up Bars MAY sit on two lower to enable climbing to hang on highest bar. No hanging by knees on the highest bar. If can't get up there

alone do NOT LIFT. Equipment is to use your own muscles!

<u>BASKETBALL HOOPS</u> – do not stand under the basket when others are shooting, get ball and move to the side quickly.

<u>SWINGS</u> – No walking in front or behind someone swinging. No jumping off swings. NO UNDERDOGS! Ok to be on belly on the swing, NO STANDING on them however.
