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

A Message From Mrs. Bradley

During November students in Kindergarten, Grade one and Multiage classes were introduced to conflict resolution skills - an important communication skill. Building on the theme of Friendship reviewed in October, students



acknowledged that sometimes friends do not always get along. We talked about conflict as a normal part of life but learned there are choices students can make to keep their bodies and feelings safe.

In Kindergarten we read and discussed Words are not for Hurting by Elizabeth Verdick or Hands are family diversity. Students are not for Hitting by Martine Agassi. Afterward, students role-played the many positive ways they can use their hands and words in school.

mended by conflict resolution experts, students role-played solving peer problems.


Multi - age students learned the basic steps of solving conflicts with peers: Calming down, Getting together, Taking turns Talking and Listening, Brainstorming for Ideas, Choosing a Plan and Trying it out. These skills take much practice and time to become second nature. Reinforcing peaceful problem solving at home may be helpful for your child and family. Winter Vacation Reading Tips

Reading over the winter break is crucial for your child to continue to grow as a reader. Though reading over the holidays is an enjoyable task, it's easy to get lost in the preparations and forget to keep children on a regular reading schedule during the break. Try to keep your kids reading for at least 15-20 minutes daily so that they return to school ready to read. Here are some extra ideas to work on those reading skills!



- Have your children read holiday cards when they are received in the mail, and let them write a message in outgoing cards.
- Let children read ingredients from holiday recipes while you bake together. It's a great way for them to learn measurements and temperatures.
- Set aside time for kids to "show off" their new reading skills to visiting relatives. Children love being the focus of attention, and grandparents are usually more than willing to see their progress.
- Make special winter or holiday readings a tradition. Find a special book and have each member of the family read from it at the same time each year.
- Even if no books make your child's wish list, make sure you give at least one as a gift, and encourage him to read it, or read it aloud to her.
