Unit 1: Noun Inflection System**

Essential Understandings	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Latin nouns, pronouns, and adjectives occur in five different cases, which denote the relationship of the noun to the verb of the clause. These cases are indicated by the inflection or ending on the noun. Nouns and adjectives fall into five groups, called declensions, which each use one set of inflections.
Essential Questions	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ How do we read a language that does not rely on word order to indicate syntax?
Essential Knowledge	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Latin sentences do not rely on word order to express syntax, but on noun inflection. ▪ Adjectives must agree with nouns in gender, case, and number
