Essential Understandings	 Infinitives are verbal nouns that express the essential action of a verb, in both voices and three tenses, but unlimited by person and number.
Essential Questions	 As verbal nouns they act in sentences as subjects or objects. How do infinitives work in English and Latin?
Essential Knowledge	 English and Latin have several infinitive uses in common, but in some key places they differ. In Latin infinitives are indeclinable neuter singular nouns that occur in the active and passive of three tenses, the present, perfect, and future. There are six distinct uses of infinitives in Latin, recognizable by the verbs that introduce them.
Vocabulary	 <u>Terms</u>: verbal noun, infinitive, tense, voice, object, complementary, subject, subject accusative, impersonal verbs, indirect statement, purpose, introducing verb
Essential Skills	 Form and translate Latin infinitives in all tenses and voices. Identify uses of infinitives in English and Latin. Recognize and translate infinitives in reading passages.
