Unit 15: Livy**

Essential Understandings	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Titus Livius (“Livy”), lived from 64 BC to 9 BC. He was commissioned by Augustus to write the history of the Roman world. He wrote in a vivid and highly stylized manner, and immediately was a success. 35 of the original 142 books of <i>Ab Urbe Condita</i> remain, and they are popular reading for young Latin students, mingling strict history with anecdotes and legend.
