Students should learn the basic nouns (300+) in the five declensions, the basic verbs in the four conjugations125), the seven irregular verbs, adjectives of the three declensions (75), all pronouns, and most adverbs, prepositions, and conjunctions (100) 70% of English words are derived from Latin, and connections between the two languages and practice with identifying Latin word roots will greatly enhance one's English vocabulary. There are also many borrowed words and Latin expressions commonly used in English
