<p>Essential Understandings</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Communications is the central purpose of language; it reveals characteristics and peculiarities of distinct cultures. ▪ Comparing cultures through language can be a powerful tool in developing cultural awareness.
<p>Essential Questions</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ How does one describe two simultaneous actions? ▪ How does one clarify purpose and restrictions within a sentence? ▪ How does one sequence events within a sentence? ▪ How does one state what happens or will happen as the result of a certain event?
<p>Essential Knowledge</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The word “al” plus a verb infinitive are used to describe simultaneous actions. ▪ The infinitive is used after certain prepositions, and the subjunctive is used after certain conjunctions. The subjunctive or the indicative moods can be used after the word “cuando”.
