Brunswick School Department Social Studies Grade 6 Mesoamerican Civilizations

Unit Overview

Students investigate how physical geography influences the rise and fall of societies, focusing on the Maya, Inca, and Aztec civilizations. Social structure, religion, technology, and daily life all shaped these empires. Leaders such as Pachacuti, Hernan Cortes, and Moctezuma II, will be studied along with various locations such as Peru, Andes Mountains, Honduras, Yucatan Peninsula, Lake Texcoco and Machu Picchu in Mesoamerica. Students will compare and contrast the three civilizations in terms of locations, accomplishments and histories.

Essential Understandings

- Geography dictates human settlement patterns.
- Ancient civilizations laid the foundation for future societies.
- Characteristics of civilizations are common across time and place.
- The relationship between humans and environment is reciprocal; humans are both impacted and impact their environments in significant ways.
