Brunswick School Department Social Studies Grade 8 20th Century Thematic Unit

Unit Overview

This unit looks at the themes of conflict, culture, politics, immigration, and innovation through the lens of Twentieth Century America. Prominent events such as World War I, World War II, the Depression, Cold War, and the September 11 attacks will be reviewed. Students will also study inventions and inventors of the period and study the challenges and changes that are shaping the United States today. Guided readings of both primary and secondary resources will be employed.

Essential Understandings

- *20th Century Conflict:* Serious disagreements between the United States and other world powers led to warfare, as well as alliances, among nations throughout the *20th* Century.
- *20th Century Culture:* Throughout the decades of the 20th century, the customs, arts, social institutions, and achievements within the United States were affected by a variety of historical events.
- 20th Century Politics: Competing ideas about governance (manner of government) affected the political climate throughout the 20th Century leading to the rise and fall of different power groups.
- *20th Century Immigration:* In the late 1800's, a new wave of immigrants came to the United States for economic and political reasons. For many immigrants, the goal was to become part of American life and culture.
- *20th Century Innovation:* Beginning in the late 1800's, abundant resources, new technology, government aid to business, and the railroad boom all contributed to industrial growth. Inventors created hundreds of devices that made life easier. The automobile and the airplane launched an age of fast transportation.
