Grade 8 Maine Studies Today

Unit Overview

This unit will cover the history of Maine since World War II. Students will study the similarity and differences between local, state and national governments while learning about their roles in current civic issues. The economic conditions and technological advances that have occurred will also be covered. Elected Maine Officials and prominent people and events will be introduced. Geographic reasoning will be stressed through mapping counties, physical features and boundaries. Primary and secondary sources will be used.

History, geography, government, and economics have shaped the cultural and ethnic heritage of Maine.
