Essential Knowledge	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Language Arts includes the learning and application of language. ▪ Children acquire language through sounds, words, writing, reading, grammar, etc. ▪ Legible handwriting is a basic language tool. ▪ Caldecott Awards are given annually to the best illustrators of picture books. ▪ Picture books can be evaluated using a variety of criteria including type, originality, purpose, and art work. ▪ Authors and illustrators use a variety of techniques to present books and stories to children. ▪ Children’s art work can be described in developmental stages and reveal information about emotions and concerns. ▪ Many books written about children increase our understanding which in turn nurtures our ability to become better caretakers, mentors, and teachers.

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<p>Sample Lessons And Activities</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Brainstorm the meaning of “Language Arts” through discussion and an activity page. Determine together how it evolves from the beginning of development. ▪ Review how speech develops and practice creating sounds while recognizing the physical mechanics including the lips, throat, etc. ▪ Practice the manuscript technique to perfection and apply it to the writing of an original Diamante poem. ▪ Complete two web search worksheets to identify two successful author/illustrators, their background education and experience, a list of their books, and a sketch in their typical style. ▪ Evaluate two picture books according to given criteria. Present to classmates as though they were children. Include an introduction and follow up activity. Compare and contrast the books and select a preference. ▪ Study a variety of examples of children’s art work from an art therapy brochure. Match the art work to the traumatic event the child has experienced. ▪ Use distinguishing factors of children’s art to categorize them into the three basic stages of art development. ▪ Complete a written book report to share four main points. Include a personal assessment of how the book has increased your understanding of children.
<p>Sample Classroom Assessment Methods</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Completed diagram showing the process of language development. ▪ The alphabet in manuscript, practiced to perfection. ▪ Completed diamante poem written in manuscript. ▪ Two completed web search worksheets of authors/illustrators. ▪ Presentation of two picture books with prescribed evaluation criteria. ▪ Presentation of a chalk talk on the blackboard plus the completion and presentation of an original chalk talk. ▪ Oral sharing of a summary of highlights and evaluative comments from their book report. ▪ Written book report. ▪ Quiz over all of the book reports. ▪ Oral identification of the stages of art development and a written quiz over the information.
