Identify questions, concepts, and testable hypotheses that guide scientific investigations.b. Design and safely conduct methodical scientific investigations, including experiments with controls.c. Use statistics to summarize, describe, analyze, and interpret results.d. Formulate and revise scientific investigations and models using logic and evidence.e. Use a variety of tools and technologies to improve investigations and communications.f. Recognize and analyze alternative explanations and models using scientific criteria.g. Communicate and defend scientific ideas. <p>B2. Provide examples that illustrate how technological solutions to problems sometimes lead to new problems or new fields of inquiry. <p>C3. Explain how ethical, societal, political, economic, religious, and cultural factors influence the development and use of science and technology. <p>C4. Provide examples of criteria that distinguish scientific explanations from pseudoscientific ones.
